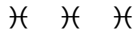
In the midst of the Judean Revolt against Rome, the situation grew desperate. The Jews of Jerusalem were starving - the siege of Jerusalem grew ever more fierce. The wealthy threw their money into the street - the scarcity was so severe there was nothing to buy.

It appeared that Judaism itself might be lost.

So they devised a plan to sneak their leader, the great sage Rabbi Yochanan ben Zakkai, out of the city. They faked Yochanan's death, and his students carried him out of the city in a casket. Rabbi Yochanan went to see the Roman ruler Vespasian: "Peace be to you, O King..."

Vespasian said: "You have committed a grave offense - for you have called me king though I am not one." Yochanan replied, "With certainty you will become King." Just then, a messenger from Rome arrived declaring that Vespasian was named the next Caesar of the empire.

"What reward can I give you?" asked Vespasian. Knowing nothing could be done to avert the destruction of Jerusalem, Yochanan replied, "Give me Yavneh, and her Sages, and the line of Rabban Gamaliel."



What followed was a period of horrible slaughter and destruction. In the aftermath of the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem and the quashing of the Judean revolt, the carnage was almost beyond description. The Roman historian Josephus described it this way:

*When they went in numbers into the lanes of the city, with their swords drawn, they slew those whom they overtook, without mercy, and set fire to the houses wherein the Jews were hiding, and burnt every soul in them, and laid waste a great many of the rest; and when they came to the houses to plunder them, they found in them entire families of dead men, and the upper rooms full of dead corpses, that is of such as died by the famine; they then stood in a horror at this sight, and went out without touching anything. But although they had this commiseration for such as were destroyed in that manner, yet had they not the same for those that were still alive, but they ran every one through whom they met, and obstructed the very lanes with their dead bodies, and made the whole city run down with blood, to such a degree indeed that the fire of many of the houses was quenched with these men's blood.*

*Josephus - The Wars of the Jews, Book 6:8*

The capacity of humankind to inflict horror confounds the mind and the imagination. The violence visited on our people throughout the ages besets the soul with an overwhelming darkness. How was it possible for a people so violated and savaged, to rekindle the light of holiness and life in the human spirit?

Hillel taught:

On this Yom Kippur afternoon, we come together to champion an idea - that to be human is to elevate the spirit, to unite our will and our lives with the Holy One. We were created, as the Psalmist says, a little less than Divine, and so in the face of inhumane evil, we seek to restore some sense of our Divinity.



In saving the rabbis, Rabbi Yochanan succeeded in saving Judaism. The rabbis answered the horror of the Roman destruction with a burst of holy creativity, casting a mold for rabbinic Judaism that we practice today.

Two of the disciples who carried their master out of Jerusalem, Rabbi Eliezer ben Hyrcanus and Rabbi Yehoshua ben Hananiah, found themselves in the midst of a dispute.

It has been taught: On that day Rabbi Eliezer brought forward every imaginable argument, but the other sages did not accept them. So he said: 'If the Halakha (law) agrees with me, let this carob-tree prove it!' Thereupon the carob-tree uprooted itself and moved a hundred cubits out of its place...

'No proof can be brought from a carob-tree,' they retorted.

Again he said to them: 'If the Halakha agrees with me, let the stream of water prove it!' Whereupon the stream of water flowed backwards.

'No proof can be brought from a stream of water,' they rejoined.

Again he urged: 'If the Halakha agrees with me, let the walls of the studyhall prove it,' whereupon the walls inclined to fall. But Rabbi Yehoshua rebuked them, saying: 'When scholars are engaged in a Halakhic dispute, don't interfere!' Hence they did not fall, in honor of Rabbi Yehoshua, nor did they return upright, in honor of Rabbi Eliezer...

Finally, he said to them: 'If the Halakha agrees with me, let it be proved by a Heavenly Voice!' Whereupon a Heavenly Voice cried out: 'Why do you dispute with Rabbi Eliezer, seeing that in all matters the Halakha agrees with him!' But Rabbi Yehoshua arose and exclaimed: '*Lo BaShamayim Hi* - It is not in heaven. (Deuteronomy 30:12)'

Centuries later, Rabbi Natan met Elijah the Prophet and asked him: 'What did the Holy One, do in that hour?'

'God laughed [with joy], he replied, saying, 'My children have defeated Me! My children have defeated Me!

*Talmud Bava Metzia 59b*

We learn from this Talmudic parable that when confronted with inhuman brutality, we reclaim our humanity through Torah and tradition, through a fundamental belief that it is our responsibility and duty as humankind to live with one another in holy relationship bound by principles of justice and the rule of law.

Torah is God's divine gift of love, and it is through our embrace of Torah that we not only feel God's love for us, but express our love for God. In the moments across the ages, when our people was forced to suffer the greatest inhumanities, it was then that we strove to be human. We turned to Torah and tradition, to poetry and prayer, to a renewed commitment to justice and law, and even when we often couldn't save our individual bodies, still we sought to save our collective soul.

On November 27, 1095 Pope Urban II called for a crusade to liberate the Holy Land from the Muslims. Godfrey of Bouillon, who mortgaged all his land to raise money to build a crusader army of thousands, vowed that he would not set out for the Crusade until he had avenged the crucifixion with Jewish blood.

Led by the infamous Count Emicho, the crusaders surrounded the synagogue in Speyer. Unable to break in, they attacked any Jews they could find who had not hidden inside. One woman was captured and was offered conversion or death. She proudly chose martyrdom - giving her life *Al Kiddush HaShem* - sanctifying the name of God.

Others also chose martyrdom rather than forced conversion. As the crusaders moved along the Rhine, they came to Worms, where the crusaders first attacked the Jews who had stayed in their houses, and then, eight days later, butchered those who had sought refuge in the bishop's castle.

Moving on to Mainz, the Jews first sought to take up arms against the horde, but were overmatched by the strength and brutality of the crusaders. More than one thousand Jews died either by the savagery of the crusaders or by their own hands as martyrs.

But after the catastrophic slaughter of thousands, the Jews turned to God and to their tradition. They raised their voices in lament, composing powerful *piyutim* - prayerful poems to restore their faith:

*Let my eyes flow with tears, I will wail and shake my head.  
I will make eulogies for the Torah with weeping and with sackcloth...  
Where are Torah, Talmud, and students?...  
In my bitter agony and grief, I will compose a dirge,  
Holy congregations! Their massacre I remember today...  
Mighty God, who like You forgives bundles of sins?  
You are silent and restrained; why do You not gird Yourself with fury?...  
My eyes, my eyes, flow with tears.  
Our singing has turned into mourning.  
My flute accompanies mourners, without respite and never abating.  
Who will approach me with consolation,  
And who will encourage me to awaken?*

Following the Crusades, Jewish communities found renewal and flourished. The Golden Age of Spain saw a resurgence of Jewish creativity and culture, with a proliferation of poetry, philosophy, and mystical piety. But the darkness of the Inquisition soon descended on Spain - with the brutal tortures and massacres culminating in the expulsion of Jews in 1492.

Jews fled to North Africa, France, Italy, Turkey, and the Netherlands, desperate for safe harbor anywhere they could find. As they settled in new cities and towns, Jews were relegated to ghettos, separated by high walls and locked gates.

But the Inquisition and expulsion could not extinguish Jewish hope and life. Many Jews migrated to Eastern Europe and Jewish life took root in the cities and shtetls of Poland, Lithuania, and the Ukraine. There they established great centers of learning and Jewish culture.

The greatest 500 yeshiva students from Europe were invited to study in Lublin. So elite was this yeshiva that each was assigned a number, ranking them on the basis of their learning and erudition. From morning to night, their every need was met so as not to interrupt their learning.

Life was not easy for the simple Jewish peasants. In a small Ukrainian village, a young boy named Israel was orphaned at the age of five and adopted by the town, who came to realize the brilliant genius of their young ward. He became known as the Ba'al Shem Tov - the Master of the Good Name, a master of Kabbalah and mystic wisdom. In a vision he realized his life's mission was to help the Jews draw nearer to God by embracing the joy and spirit of Jewish law.

*Rejoice constantly. Ponder and believe with complete faith that the Divine Presence is with you and protecting you; that you are bound up with the Creator and the Creator is bound up with you, with your every limb and every faculty; that your focus is fixed on the Creator and the Creator's focus is fixed upon you.*

The Hasidic movement he founded spawned dynasties of great spiritual leaders whose wisdom captured the imaginations and souls of thousands of Jews across Eastern Europe.

At the same time, the Enlightenment in Europe shone a lamp of hope and opportunity for Jews to explore their humanity beyond the boundaries of the Jewish community. Beginning with Moses Mendelssohn who grew from his traditional Jewish upbringing to become one of the great thinkers of Western Philosophy, Jews came out of the ghetto to embrace the larger cultures around them.

Jews entered the universities, exploring the sciences and the arts. In Prussia, Israel Jacobson began to imagine a world in which religious tolerance reigned supreme. In 1801 he opened his school in Seesen, where forty Jewish children would learn alongside twenty Christian children, imagining that children raised together and learning together could break down the hatreds and bigotries that defined the chasm between religious peoples.

And yet still, pogroms and massacres tore at the fabric of the Jewish people in Europe. No matter how committed were Jewish efforts to

weave themselves into the fabric of European life, still antisemitism and hatred caused that fabric to fray.

Toward the end of 1894, a Jewish captain in the French army, Alfred Dreyfus, was accused of passing secrets to the German army. The trial of the century ensued, with Captain Dreyfus unwavering in his assertion of his innocence. A young lawyer named Theodor Herzl covered the trial as a foreign correspondent for the Vienna *Neue Freie Presse*. So overwrought at the injustice of his corrupt conviction on charges of treason, Herzl locked himself in his room, and wrote his ideas in what would become his book *The Jewish State*.

*Therefore I believe that a wondrous generation of Jews will spring into existence. The Maccabeans will rise again. Let me repeat once more my opening words: The Jews who wish for a State will have it. We shall live at last as free men on our own soil, and die peacefully in our own homes. The world will be freed by our liberty, enriched by our wealth, magnified by our greatness. And whatever we attempt there to accomplish for our own welfare, will react powerfully and beneficially for the good of humanity.*

He began his work to convince Jewish leaders and the political leaders of his time that the time had come for the world to embrace Zionism as the nationalistic aspirations of the Jewish people. Herzl devoted the next ten years of his life to building the State of Israel – convening six Zionist Congress meetings in Basel, Switzerland which brought together delegates from all over Europe and the world, traveling throughout the continent to build support for the Jewish state.

In the last years of his life, Herzl wrote *Altneuland*, “Old-New Land” in which he dreamed of the utopia that would be built in a Jewish homeland, combining the best of European culture with the best of Jewish heritage, a country in which Jew and non-Jew would work together in brotherly collaboration, where there would be peace, prosperity, and justice for all.

And so we returned, in ever greater numbers, to our ancient and modern homeland. We drained the swamps, planted our trees, established our homes, and renewed our dreams.

But the nationalist fervor that inspired our people was not reserved to us. The pernicious evil of anti-Semitism swept over nations where we had once felt at home. Desperate to flee the Nazi menace, we found the doors of the world's nations closed to us.

The storm of hate-filled evil brought an onslaught of mechanized agony such as the world had never known. But while the Holocaust forced many to turn away from a God whom they believed had turned away from them, still others drew from deep reservoirs of faith to find the will to survive.

*That's the difficulty in these times: ideals, dreams, and cherished hopes rise within us, only to meet the horrible truth and be shattered. It's really a wonder that I haven't dropped all my ideals, because they seem so absurd and impossible to carry out. Yet I keep them, because in spite of everything I still believe that people are really good at heart. I simply can't build up my hopes on a foundation consisting of confusion, misery, and death. I see the world gradually being turned into a wilderness. I hear the ever-approaching thunder, which will destroy us too. I can feel the sufferings of millions and yet, if I look up into the heavens, I think that it will all come right, that this cruelty too will end, and that peace and tranquility will return again. In the meantime, I must uphold my ideals, for perhaps the time will come when I shall be able to carry them out.*

In the camps they chanted Torah from memory. They stored meager rations of fat to create crude candles for Chanukah. In the face of the greatest onslaught of inhumanity, we fought back by insisting on being human.

In Terezin, thirty miles north of Prague, a concentration camp was established in the fortress established by the Austrian Emperor Joseph II in the late 18th century. More than 150,000 Jews were sent there, including 15,000 children, and held there for months or years, before being sent by rail transports to their deaths at Treblinka and Auschwitz extermination camps in occupied Poland, as well as to smaller camps elsewhere. Fewer than 150 children survived.

Terezin's detainees included scholars, philosophers, scientists, visual artists, and musicians of all types, some of whom had achieved international renown, and many of these contributed to the camp's cultural life. An orchestra performed, a choir sang. The famed Rabbi Leo Baeck was taken to Terezin and would engage in Talmudic discourse and philosophical discussion while enduring the back-breaking work of ferrying trash around the camp.

Following the war, the atrocities were laid bare for all to see. How would the world respond to the greatest crimes ever perpetrated against humanity? Just months after the Nazi surrender, an International Military Tribunal was established to counter inhumanity with justice.

On October 18, 1945, the opening session of the first international war crimes trial in history took place in Berlin, Germany. Unable to find a suitable venue in the destroyed Nazi capital, the court soon

moved to the city of Nuremberg in Bavaria, where the highest profile cases were heard in the aptly named Palace of Justice.

Robert Jackson, a justice of the US Supreme Court and a former US attorney general, was appointed the chief American prosecutor for the trials by President Harry Truman. In his opening statement before the court, Jackson said:

*The privilege of opening the first trial in history for crimes against the peace of the world imposes a grave responsibility. The wrongs which we seek to condemn and punish have been so calculated, so malignant, and so devastating, that civilization cannot tolerate their being ignored because it cannot survive their being repeated. That four great nations flushed with victory and stung with injury stay the hand of vengeance and voluntarily submit their captive enemies to the judgment of law is one of the most significant tributes that Power has ever paid to Reason.*

The remnant who stumbled out of the camps faced an extraordinary existential choice. How to live in the face of such loss? How to rebuild a shattered life? For what shall I live if all was lost? For whom shall I live if none survived?

But live they did. They set as their life's mission to memorialize the Shoah, to secure the state of Israel, to gather in the exiles and to marginalize the hatred that brought about so much destruction. Walking with the limp of the memories they bore, they found love, they raised children, they built families and lives. As Elie Wiesel taught.

*We owe it to our past not to lose hope. Say what you will, despair is not the solution. Not for us. Quite the contrary. We must show our children that in spite of everything, we keep our faith -- in ourselves and even in mankind, though mankind may not be worthy of such faith. We must persuade our children and theirs that three thousand years of history must not be permitted to end with an act of despair ...*



And so we not only rebuilt our lives and our communities here in America, but also in the land of Israel. As the UN announced the vote for partition, we rejoiced and danced in the streets. And as war

began, thousands who had walked out of the camps marched to the front lines to secure the Jewish state.

The rebirth of the Jewish state was in many ways a rebirth of the Jewish people. Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook, the first Chief Rabbi of Israel taught:

*The land of Israel is not some external entity.  
It is not merely an external acquisition for the Jewish people.  
It is not merely a means of uniting the populace.  
It is not merely a means of strengthening our physical existence.  
It is not even merely a means of strengthening our spiritual existence.  
In the land of Israel,  
Grow the letters of our soul.  
There,  
They reveal illumination.  
They draw down mighty life  
From the fire of life  
Of the entire community of the people of Israel.*

And how do we reassert our humanity. In the simple act of living. By making the extraordinary act of living life in our ancient and modern homeland simply mundane. By recognizing the simple sacramental acts of gleaning wisdom, cultivating knowledge, nurturing compassion, striving for justice, pushing ourselves to achieve, standing back in wonder and awe, and renewing each day, and in this new year, a commitment to live the full depths of our humanity, even in a world that is so often inhuman.

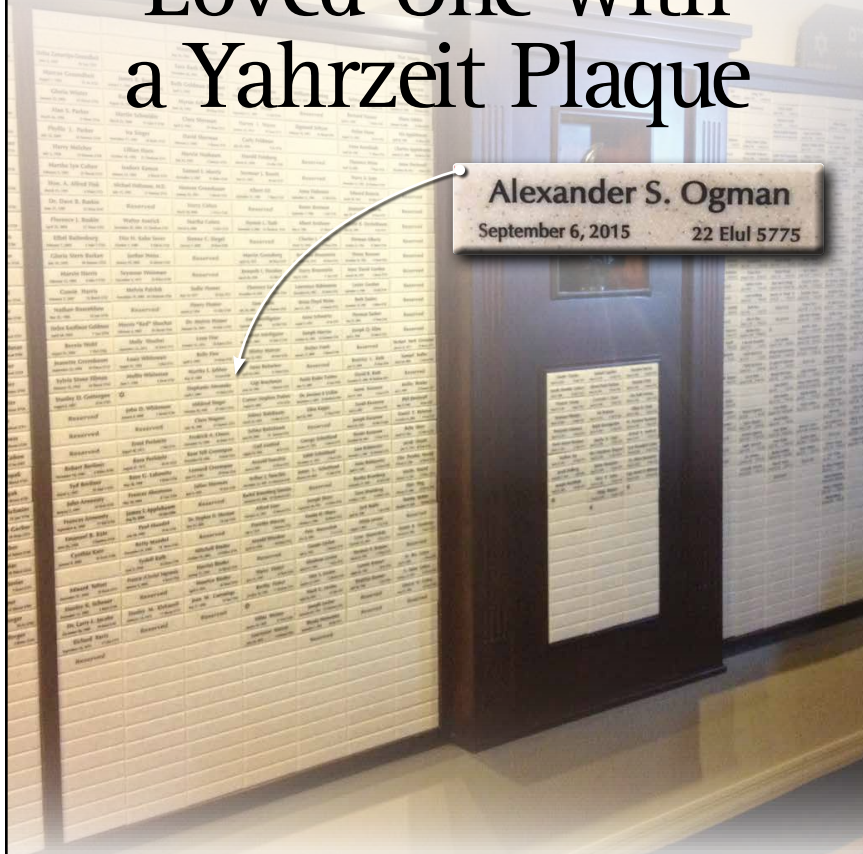

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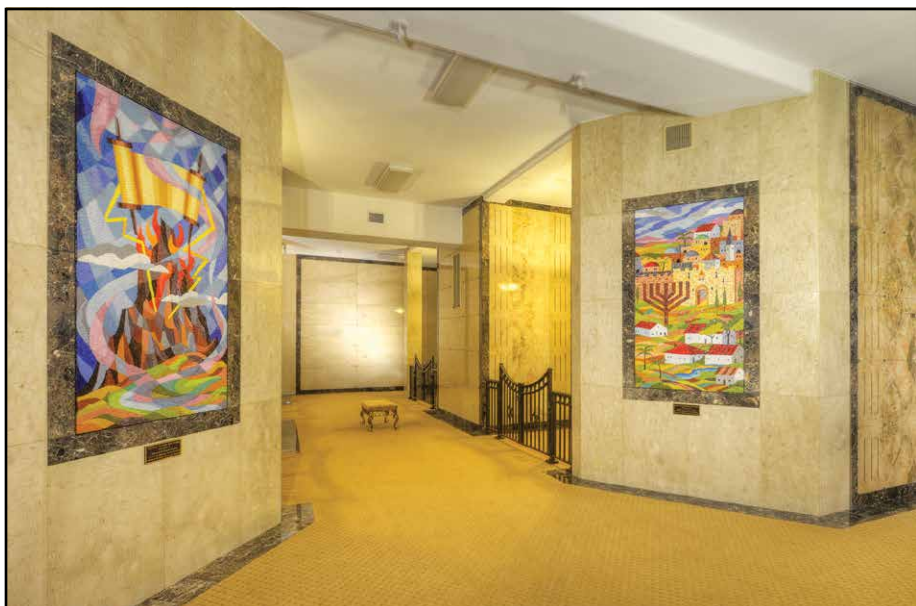
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
